# **Goat Shearing**



The Breed Show starts by 9am and is usually over before noon. During the breed show, you can volunteer to write comments for the rabbit judge.

The judge really appreciates the help. After the show, you then have free time to explore the Fair or do a shift or two with the Task Force. Later on, there is an optional exam called The Champion Challenge down in the cattle show ring. This is a written exam specific to your species. So, you can take a test on poultry, rabbits, goats, swine or cattle. Literally a hundred or more kids line up and take the exams. The test has questions about animal management, commercial uses, diseases and care. If you get a high score on this test, you're invited to go back the next day to do the practical hands-on part of the test.

The next day, Friday, is Rabbit Showmanship. Again, we come in our whites and wait for our turn. It's Group Showmanship, but each judge does things differently. This year, the judge had a short 10-question written exam that would help her figure out who did the best at

both the routine and knowledge. I ended up winning first place in Junior Showmanship. They gave me a big plaque, and it also meant that I qualified for Master Showmanship which took place the following weekend.

Saturday, they have the Quiz Bowl for teams who want to compete against each other in a Jeopardy-style contest. Team mates buzz in to answer questions that are worth different amount of points. My team has won this event 3 years in a row. We didn't compete this year, though. Sunday night is when you come back to take your animals home. It's a quick and easy tear down.
